Open Arms FCE in Marion County continue to deliver “Books for Babies” to hospitals in their area.

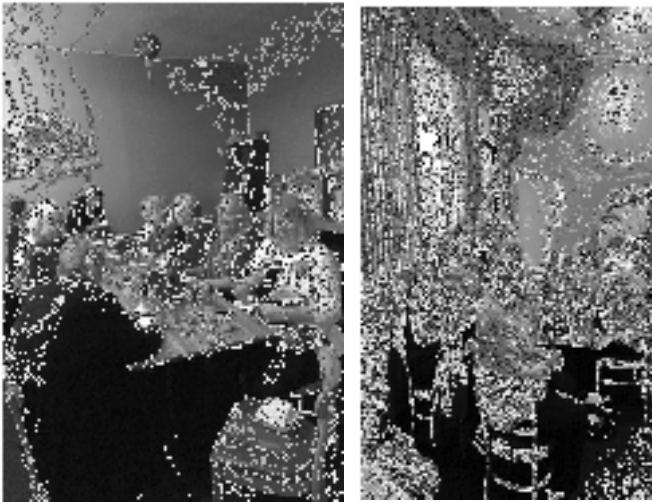
