

Mary's father has five daughters:


1. Nana, 2. Nene, 3. Nini, 4. Nono, and ???

GARDENING TIPS FOR FEBRUARY

Planning:

- Tune up lawn mower and garden equipment before the busy season begins.
- Have soil tested to determine its nutrient needs. For more information, call the Master Gardeners.
- Plan to add herbaceous perennial flowers to your flowering landscape this spring. Examples include candytuft, peony, penstemon and coneflowers.
- Fertilize rhubarb with manure or a complete fertilizer.
- Incorporate cover crops or other organic matter into soil.
- Prune clematis, Virginia creeper and other vining ornamentals.

Planting/propagation

- Plant windowsill container gardens of carrots, lettuce or parsley.
- Plant asparagus if the ground is warm enough.
- Plant seed flats of cole crops (cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli and Brussels sprouts), indoors or in a greenhouse.
- Where soil is dry enough and workable, plant garden peas and sweet peas.
- Good time to plant new roses.

News Paper article proves that we need to
"toot" our horn and let people know that
FCE does still exist.

The February 3rd article in the News-Register
had a review on the play "Calendar Girls". It was
stated by Starla Pointer that the women were
members of a chapter of England's nationwide
Women's Institute, similar to the Extension Service
homemakers' clubs that once existed here.
Members get together to socialize, hear educational
programs, exercise and bond by sharing stories of
their husbands and children.

Upon reading the article, Anne Engen responded
to Starla: I always enjoy reading your articles but in
the February 3rd edition about the Calendar Girls'
play you misspoke. You killed off my favorite
organization!

Through the years its name has changed -- 1936
to 1964 groups were called Home Demonstration
Clubs. In 1964 the name was changed to Extension
Homemakers and in 1992 the name became
National Association for Family and Community
Education (FCE). Oregon State provides 3 or 4
educational lessons each year. Times have changed
and OSU Home Economics Department has been
folded into the College of Health and Human
Sciences. Our other lessons through the year are
written by our National FCE Board, the Oregon
FCE Board or FCE members.

We belong to Associated Country Women of the
World (ACWW) formed in 1933. It is the only
international organization representing rural women
and homemakers around the world. Approximately
nine million women in over 70 countries belong to
ACWW which support projects to help rural women
in Africa, Asia, India, Nepal, Islands in the South
Pacific and South America. Some of the projects we
are helping with are clean water and sanitation
projects, food production and nutrition classes.

This spring my FCE group will celebrate 44 years
of learning, laughing, sharing sorrows and joys,
community service projects and some mighty fine
cooking.
